New Warehouse Brings More Than Storage

Hytrol continues to expand. The Jonesboro-based conveyor system manufacturer broke ground for its new 150,000-square-foot warehouse and distribution center on June 24th. When completed, the new facility will serve as Hytrol's main warehouse.

"Our company is growing rapidly, and we require a larger warehouse facility," said President David Peacock. "By selecting to be a part of the E-Commerce Park, we will be consolidating from three warehouses to one and removing extra equipment from our main plant."

The new warehouse is the first announced project in E-Commerce Park. Haag-Brown, the developers of E-Commerce Park, says it will provide up to 3 million square feet of logistics, warehouse, and manufacturing space.

"This is the result of two companies who have been dedicated to the support and growth of Northeast Arkansas for many years," said Josh Brown, developer of the project and a principal in Haag Brown Development. "Hytrol has been a cornerstone of Northeast Arkansas for decades, and we're excited to invest in the future of Northeast Arkansas with them as a partner to ensure that our area continues to be competitive for the variety of industries that call this area home."

The addition of the new warehouse will have the secondary benefit of creating more space at Hytrol's main facility on Highland Drive.

Hytrol will use that newly created space for administrative functions, including its panel shop, non-manufacturing support activities, and the company's engineering department.

The announcement marks the latest chapter in Hytrol's growth in the last two years. In 2021, Hytrol expanded its operation by adding a manufacturing facility in Fort Smith, Arkansas.

Hytrol leaders say building the new warehouse in Jonesboro shows Hytrol's continued commitment to investing locally.

"It is important for us to show our dedication and commitment to Northeast Arkansas," stated Vice President of Corporate Development Bob West. "The creation of this center will serve not only to benefit Hytrol but the surrounding area as well."

Ramson's Inc. of Jonesboro will build the new facility. The goal is to have the project completed by the Spring of 2023.

Project Updates

Colson Project Nears Completion

Colson keeps on rolling with the transition into their new facility. Robert Somers, Colson's VP of Global Quality & Safety, says they are 80% complete with the move from the Airport Road site to the new building. Somers says they plan to have 95% of the operation moved by the end of September. The remainder of the work is scheduled to be finished by the end of the year.

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
Colson still has roughly a dozen machines and lines operating and warehousing at the Airport Road site.

The new plant includes processes they didn't have on Airport Road. Somers says a new stamping press, robotic welder, and a zinc plating line are in use at the new site.

Spirit Ready To Wrap Up Construction

One more step and Spirit Fitness will begin the move into its new facility on Barnhill Road. Officials at Spirit say the company's new 150,000 SF warehouse will be operational in August. Right now, they say they are waiting on racking installation before the move-in process can begin.

The \$10M project will house Spirit's Technical Support Department and Warranty Parts Department, creating approximately 40-50 new jobs. Spirit's current facility on Nestle Road will remain in operation when the new site opens.



Camfil Looking Toward Move-In

Equipment is being set into position at Camfil APC's new facility with an eye on starting production in the 3rd quarter.

Officials at Camfil say the new 247,000 SF factory in the Craighead Technology Park is still in the construction phase, with the installation of factory infrastructure at the top of the list. They expect to complete the factory infrastructure in mid to late August.

Camfil officials add the plan calls for finishing the factory offices in October. When complete, production will begin sometime in the 3rd quarter. According to Camfil, the move into the offices will follow in the fourth quarter.

New Trail At Craighead Forest

Patrons at Craighead Forest Park are getting a new walking and cycling path. Jonesboro Parks and Recreation Director Danny Kapales says a 1,400-foot path is under construction along the road at Access Five. That is the road that leads from the main road at Craighead Forest Park to Rotary Park Playground, the splash pad, and the kid fishing pond.

Kapales says the 10-foot wide path will run alongside the East side of the road, accommodating cyclists and pedestrians. He says the project cost is \$150,000. He expects completion by the end of October.



The new Jonesboro Shooting Sports Complex continues to take shape. An official Grand Opening was held in May to celebrate the project's progress.

According to posts on the Shooting Sports Complex's Facebook page, the dry weather has allowed dirt work to move along much quicker. Work at the rifle and pistol clubhouse is progressing with the drywall now in place.

Bill Campbell, with the City of Jonesboro, says the current focus is on completing the maintenance building. Campbell adds that the maintenance building, trap field, and range building should be done by the end of the year or early 2023.

Construction has begun for the new Goddard School for Early Childhood Development in Jonesboro. The 8,800 SF school is in Hill Park, just off Brown's Lane. The Jonesboro location is the fifth Goddard School in the state.





Fox Meadow Elementary students will eat lunch in a new cafeteria before the end of the year. Work begins in late July on expanding the school's cafeteria. Tate General Contractors is heading up the \$600,000 project.

ARCare is the newest resident in the Southwest Business Center on Southwest Drive. The 4,000 square-foot endcap will serve as ARcare's regional corporate office and brick-and-mortar insurance agency.



Bath and Body Works is returning to Jonesboro. The world's largest bath shop chain's newest location is in Caraway Plaza between Petco and Rack Room Shoes. This store replaces its previous location in the Mall At Turtle Creek. The store will open in September.



Year-To-Date: City & County Combined (2.0%)




